Requirements: Meet ALL Pre-Nursing Requirements

Students Planning to Attend the Associates Degree Program must follow the following guidelines:

1. Submit an Admissions Application to the University
2. Submit a Nursing Application by the **Third (3rd) Friday in September for Spring semester and Third (3rd) Friday in January for Fall semester.**
3. *Meet the Pre-Nursing Requirements for the Community College (UDCCC):
4. If you have taken college courses at another College or University, have your official transcript submitted to UDCCC.
5. Transfer students must have completed at least one course at UDCCC before they can submit an application to the nursing program and have a UDCCC grade point average of 2.5 or greater.
6. Submit a copy of your National Criminal Background Clearance check from Global Investigative Services (1109 Spring St, Suite 401, Silver Spring, MD 20910, phone 301-589-0088).
7. Submit a copy of your CPR Card for Healthcare Providers (American Heart Association).

Students **MUST TAKE** an Admission Exam as a part of the Nursing Application procedure. Once the admission exam has been taken; the nursing faculty will select the students for enrollment and a letter of acceptance into the Clinical Phase will be sent to the student.

Students are only admitted to the nursing program when they have received an acceptance letter from the Nursing program.

*The nursing program is highly **COMPETITIVE**. The number of students entering the nursing program is limited to the number of clinical spots available in any given semester. Students indicating nursing as their desired major; but, who have not entered the clinical phase of the nursing program are **NOT** nursing majors. A student becomes a nursing **MAJOR** when he or she enters the clinical phase of the program. Students who have a desire to enter the nursing program as a major are recommended to do the following:

- Do well in all the Science courses-as the foundation of the nursing profession rests on the theoretical and scientific knowledge.
- Maintain your Grade Point Average as high as possible as this is one of the key indicators in the application process. While the minimum Grade Point Average is 2.5, it is advisable that the student maintains a much higher grade point average.
- Do well in Mathematics as pharmacology courses in nursing depend on a good knowledge of math.
- Do well in English with special emphasis on your writing skills as a nurse is a key member of the health care team and thus the ability to express oneself in writing and speaking is critical to the care of patients.
